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Introduction

This sixth edition of *The Comparative Guide to American Suburbs* covers 2,795 suburban communities (35 more than last edition) with populations of 10,000 or more, located within the 75 largest metro areas in the United States.

Defined as “under” (sub) the “city” (urb), suburban communities were encouraged by zoning laws enacted 75 years ago, and popularized by a variety of effective transportation. Over time, suburbs became crowded with people and businesses relocating out of the city, and today, many suburbs include several hundred thousand people, with hi-rises, office complexes, industrial parks and shopping centers. In fact, many American suburbs are home to more people than central urban population centers; NYC suburb Hempstead, NY, for example, is larger than Pittsburgh or Salt Lake City.

Sixth Edition Highlights

This new edition details and ranks the living and business environment of 2,795 suburban communities in the country’s 75 largest metro areas. Suburbs are arranged alphabetically by metro area.

Each **Metro Area** includes six areas of concentration: *Geography; Climate; Population; Income; Housing; and Education*, broken down into 16 subcategories.

New to this edition is a detailed map for each metropolitan area. This allows the user to see the location of each suburb in relation to its Metro Center.

Each **Suburb Profile** includes 10 areas of concentration: *Geography; History; Population; Economy; Income; Housing; Safety; Educational Attainment; Transportation (NEW) and Information Contacts*. These major areas are broken down into 44 categories (five more than last edition). **New categories** are *Employment by Occupation; Travel Time to Work; Means of Transportation to Work; Homeowner Vacancy Rates; and Rental Vacancy Rates*.

Following the Suburb Profiles in each chapter are **Ranking Charts** that rank all suburbs in that Metro Area according to 35 data points—from first to last (four more than last edition). These rankings include: *Poverty Rates; Population Density; Population by Race and Ethnicity (NEW); Travel Time to Work; Homeowner Costs with and without Mortgage; Homeownership Rate; Median Home Value; Violent Crime Rate; Unemployment Rate; and Education Degrees*.

National Rankings comprise more than 400 pages, and rank all 2,795 Suburbs according to each of these 35 data points, allowing for easy comparison.

The Comparative Guide to American Suburbs pulls together all available, current statistics, demographic and contact information to create consolidated, comprehensive profiles of suburb communities, plus Comparative Statistics and Rankings that are not available elsewhere. Users will find it easy to learn about individual suburban communities, and how these 2,795 suburbs compare with each other—a valuable, unique component of this edition.

User's Guide

PLACES COVERED

The 75 largest Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) in the U.S. based on 2010 population.

1,537 incorporated municipalities. Municipalities are incorporated as either cities, villages, towns or boroughs.

548 minor civil divisions (called towns and townships) for the states where the Census Bureau has determined that they serve as general-purpose governments. Those states are Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, and Wisconsin. In some states incorporated municipalities are part of minor civil divisions and in some states they are independent of them.

647 census designated places (CDP). The U.S. Bureau of the Census defines a CDP as "a statistical entity, defined for each decennial census according to Census Bureau guidelines, comprising a densely settled concentration of population that is not within an incorporated place, but is locally identified by a name. CDPs are delineated cooperatively by state and local officials and the Census Bureau, following Census Bureau guidelines. Beginning with Census 2000 there are no size limits."

Important Notes

- Several states have incorporated municipalities and minor civil divisions in the same metropolitan area with the same name. Those communities are given separate entries.
- Special care should be taken when interpreting certain statistics for communities containing large colleges or universities. College students were counted as residents of the area in which they were living while attending college (as they have been since the 1950 census). One effect this may have is skewing the figures for population, income, housing, and educational attainment.

Climate: Includes all NWS weather stations located within the MSA. Population: Figures are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas*

Population by Race: 2010 estimates includes the U.S. Bureau of the Census categories of White alone; Black alone; Asian alone; and Hispanic of any race. Alone refers to the fact that these figures are not in combination with any other race.

The concept of race, as used by the Census Bureau, reflects self-identification by people according to the race or races with which they most closely identify. These categories are socio-political constructs and should not be interpreted as being scientific or anthropological in nature. Furthermore, the race categories include both racial and national-origin groups.

- **White.** A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa. It includes people who indicate their race as "White" or report entries such as Irish, German, Italian, Lebanese, Near Easterner, Arab, or Polish.
- **Black or African American.** A person having origins in any of the Black racial groups of Africa. It includes people who indicate their race as "Black, African American, or Negro," or provide written entries such as African American, Afro-American, Kenyan, Nigerian, or Haitian.

INCOME

Per Capita Income: Per capita income is the mean income computed for every man, woman, and child in a particular group. It is derived by dividing the total income of a particular group by the total population in that group. Per capita income is rounded to the nearest whole dollar. Figures shown are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Median Household Income: Includes the income of the householder and all other individuals 15 years old and over in the household, whether they are related to the householder or not. The median divides the income distribution into two equal parts: one-half of the cases falling below the median income and one-half above the median. For households, the median income is based on the distribution of the total number of households including those with no income. Median income for households is computed on the basis of a standard distribution and is rounded to the nearest whole dollar. Figures shown are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Average Household Income: Average household income is obtained by dividing total household income by the total number of households. Figures shown are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Percent of Households with Income of \$100,000 or more: Figures shown are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Home Ownership Rate: Percentage of housing units that are owner-occupied. Figures shown are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Educational Attainment: Figures shown are 2010 estimates and show the percent of population age 25 and over with a:

- **High school diploma (including GED) or higher:** includes people whose highest degree was a high school diploma or its equivalent, people who attended college but did not receive a degree, and people who received a college, university, or professional degree. People who reported completing the 12th grade but not receiving a diploma are not high school graduates.
- **Bachelor's degree or higher**

Male/Female Ratio: Number of males per 100 females. Figures are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Marital Status: Percentage of population never married, now married, widowed, or divorced. *Source: U.S. Bureau of the Census, 2005-2009 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates.*

The marital status classification refers to the status at the time of enumeration. Data on marital status are tabulated only for the population 15 years old and over. Each person was asked whether they were "Now married," "Widowed," "Divorced," or "Never married." Couples who live together (for example, people in common-law marriages) were able to report the marital status they considered to be the most appropriate.

- **Never married.** Never married includes all people who have never been married, including people whose only marriage(s) was annulled.
- **Now married.** All people whose current marriage has not ended by widowhood or divorce. This category includes people defined as "separated."
- **Widowed.** This category includes widows and widowers who have not remarried.
- **Divorced.** This category includes people who are legally divorced and who have not remarried.

Foreign Born: Percentage of population who were not U.S. citizens at birth. Foreign-born people are those who indicated they were either a U.S. citizen by naturalization or they were not a citizen of the United States.

Homeowner Vacancy Rate: proportion of the homeowner inventory that is vacant "for sale." It is computed by dividing the number of vacant units "for sale only" by the sum of the owner-occupied units, vacant units that are "for sale only," and vacant units that have been sold but not yet occupied, and then multiplying by 100. This measure is rounded to the nearest tenth. *Source: U.S. Census Bureau, American Community Survey, 2005-2009 Five-Year Estimates.*

Rental Vacancy Rate: proportion of the rental inventory that is vacant "for rent." It is computed by dividing the number of vacant units "for rent" by the sum of the renter-occupied units, vacant units that are "for rent," and vacant units that have been rented but not yet occupied, and then multiplying by 100. This measure is rounded to the nearest tenth. *Source: U.S. Census Bureau, American Community Survey, 2005-2009 Five-Year Estimates.*

Single-Family Building Permits Issued: Building permits issued for new single-family housing units in 2010. *Source: U.S. Census Bureau, Manufacturing and Construction Division (<http://www.census.gov/const/www/permitsindex.html>).*

Multi-Family Building Permits Issued: Building permits issued for new multi-family housing units in 2010. *Source: U.S. Census Bureau, Manufacturing and Construction Division (<http://www.census.gov/const/www/permitsindex.html>).*

Statistics on housing units authorized by building permits include housing units issued in local permit-issuing jurisdictions by a building or zoning permit. Not all areas of the country require a building or zoning permit. The statistics only represent those areas that do require a permit. Current surveys indicate that construction is undertaken for all but a very small percentage of housing units authorized by building permits. A major portion typically get under way during the month of permit issuance and most of the remainder begin within the three following months. Because of this lag, the housing unit authorization statistics do not represent the number of units actually put into construction for the period shown, and should therefore not be directly interpreted as "housing starts."

Statistics are based upon reports submitted by local building permit officials in response to a mail survey. They are obtained using Form C-404 const/www/c404.pdf, "Report of New Privately-Owned Residential Building or Zoning Permits Issued." When a report is not received, missing data are either (1) obtained from the Survey of Use of Permits (SUP) which is used to collect information on housing starts, or (2) imputed based on the assumption that the ratio of current month authorizations to those of a year ago should be the same for reporting and non-reporting places.

Per Capita Income: Per capita income is the mean income computed for every man, woman, and child in a particular group. It is derived by dividing the total income of a particular group by the total population in that group. Per capita income is rounded to the nearest whole dollar. Figures shown are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Median Household Income: Includes the income of the householder and all other individuals 15 years old and over in the household, whether they are related to the householder or not. The median divides the income distribution into two equal parts: one-half of the cases falling below the median income and one-half above the median. For households, the median income is based on the distribution of the total number of households including those with no income. Median income for households is computed on the basis of a standard distribution and is rounded to the nearest whole dollar. Figures shown are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Average Household Income: Average household income is obtained by dividing total household income by the total number of households. Figures shown are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Percent of Households with Income of \$100,000+: Figures shown are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Poverty Rate: Percentage of population with income in the past 12 months below poverty level. Based on individuals for whom poverty status is determined. *Source: U.S. Bureau of the Census, 2005-2009 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates.*

Home Ownership Rate: Percentage of housing units that are owner-occupied. Figures shown are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Median Home Value: Median value of all owner-occupied housing units as reported by the owner. Figures shown are 2010 estimates. *Source: Claritas.*

Homeowner Costs w/mortgage: Median selected monthly owner costs. Based on owner-occupied housing units with a mortgage. Selected monthly owner costs are the sum of payments for mortgages, deeds of trust, contracts to purchase, or similar debts on the property (including payments for the first mortgage, second mortgages, home equity loans, and other junior mortgages); real estate taxes; fire, hazard, and flood insurance on the property; utilities (electricity, gas, and water and sewer); and fuels (oil, coal, kerosene, wood, etc.). It also includes, where appropriate, the monthly condominium fee for condominiums and mobile home costs (installment loan payments, personal property taxes, site rent, registration fees, and license fees). *Source: U.S. Bureau of the Census, 2005-2009 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates.*

Homeowner Costs w/o mortgage: Median selected monthly owner costs. Based on owner-occupied housing units without a mortgage. Selected monthly owner costs are the sum of payments for real estate taxes; fire, hazard, and flood insurance on the property; utilities (electricity, gas, and water and sewer); and fuels (oil, coal, kerosene, wood, etc.). It also includes, where appropriate, the monthly condominium fee for condominiums and mobile home costs (installment loan payments, personal property taxes, site rent, registration fees, and license fees). *Source: U.S. Bureau of the Census, 2005-2009 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates.*

Median Gross Rent: Median monthly gross rent. Based on renter-occupied housing units paying cash rent. Gross rent is the contract rent plus the estimated average monthly cost of utilities (electricity, gas, and water and sewer) and fuels (oil, coal, kerosene, wood, etc.) if these are paid by the renter (or paid for the renter by someone else). Gross rent is intended to eliminate differentials that result from varying practices with respect to the inclusion of utilities and fuels as part of the rental payment. The estimated costs of water and sewer, and fuels are reported on a 12-month basis but are converted to monthly figures for the tabulations. *Source: U.S. Bureau of the Census, 2005-2009 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates.*

SAFETY

Total Crime Rate: Total number of violent and property crimes reported per 10,000 population. Violent crimes include murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Property crimes include burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. *Source: Federal Bureau of Investigation, Uniform Crime Reports 2010 (<http://www.fbi.gov/ucr/ucr.htm>).*

Violent Crime Rate: Total number of violent crimes reported per 10,000 population. Violent crimes include murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. *Source: Federal Bureau of Investigation, Uniform Crime Reports 2010 (<http://www.fbi.gov/ucr/ucr.htm>).*

Property Crime Rate: Total number of property crimes reported per 10,000 population. Property crimes include burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. *Source: Federal Bureau of Investigation, Uniform Crime Reports 2007 (<http://www.fbi.gov/ucr/ucr.htm>).*

TRANSPORTATION

Mean Travel Time to Work: Mean travel time to work (in minutes) is the average travel time that workers usually took to get from home to work (one way) during the reference week. This measure is obtained by dividing the total number of minutes taken to get from home to work (the

aggregate travel time) by the number of workers 16 years old and over who did not work at home. The travel time includes time spent waiting for public transportation, picking up passengers and carpools, and time spent in other activities related to getting to work.
